The research presents a comprehensive and well-structured analysis of the prosodic features of academic speech, focusing primarily on the lecture genre — the core and most representative form of academic discourse. The author skillfully demonstrates how pitch, pause, intensity, duration and other prosodic parameters shape the communicative tone, expressiveness, and effectiveness of academic speech, contributing to the construction of an appropriate academic image and professional identity of the lecturer.

The methodology of the study is grounded in the principles of experimental and acoustic phonetic analysis, combined with elements of discourse analysis and prosodic interpretation. This methodological diversity ensures the reliability and validity of the results. The findings presented in the dissertation are original, theoretically significant, and practically valuable for improving communication strategies in academic settings and for developing prosodic competence in future educators and researchers. The dissertation reflects the author's high level of theoretical knowledge, analytical thinking, and research independence. Gulnaz Iskakova demonstrates a deep understanding of the current trends in phonetic and discourse studies and successfully integrates international research approaches into the national linguistic context.

The structure of the dissertation is logical and coherent; the conclusions are well supported by empirical evidence. The work meets the requirements set for doctoral dissertations in the field of Foreign Philology, and its scientific and practical contributions make it a valuable addition to modern discourse and phonetic research.
